

IBM matched his fundraising efforts with a donation and recognized his volunteer efforts with the IBM Worldwide Volunteer Award.

Andrew Penney, 1 year member

Five years ago, Andrew Penney was a single father of three children, building a life for his family in a new community. When the daycare he was using moved, he found himself with no options for his children. "I was in a panic; there was nothing available, and not being from around Regina I didn't have family or friends available to step in. At the last minute, I was told there was a daycare right in my children's school and it was just sheer luck that I found out about it," said Penney.

That daycare was the YMCA's Before and After School Program. "My boys were five and seven at the time and I was able to get both of them into the program. When I

contacted the YMCA of Regina, I found out that there were positions open that would allow me to drop my boys off at 7 a.m. so I could be at work on time, and pick them up again at 6 p.m., which gave me time to get things done before they came home for supper," said Penney. "It was just me and my boys, and over the years they have been like family— the staff and the volunteers" said Penney.

Andrew Penney was able to provide for his family with the support of the YMCA of Regina, and now his family is passing on the values that the YMCA of Regina instilled in them.

For 33 years, Fred Zinkhan has been a part of the YMCA. As a child, his father brought him on Saturday mornings in order to swim, and do gymnastics. Fred's father was also a long time member who boxed and ran track at the Y and thought the Y would provide Fred with better influences than some of the kids nearby. Fred has been a steady fixture ever since. He not only comes for the physical activities and the chance to stay in shape, but he also comes because he wants to be part of the YMCA of Regina community. At first, he didn't know many people, but he soon made friends and met folks from all walks of life – people that he may have never met at all if not for the YMCA of Regina.

The big difference between other gyms and the Y are the mental and social elements. Fred says, "I always have lunch at the Y."

This gives Fred and other members of the Y the chance to get to know others outside of the gym. Getting to know people outside your usual circles is important to Fred because it helps shape you and gives you a broader perspective. "It made me a better person getting to know people from different walks of life." He also came to the realization that perhaps first impressions are not always accurate. People aren't always what they appear; any person can turn out to be the friendliest regardless of your first impression of them. Community is defined as a "social group of any size whose members reside in a specific locality, share government, and often have a common cultural and historical heritage." the YMCA of Regina definitely fits that definition for Fred and many others!

1890

Regina's Provisional YMCA was initially located on the second floor of this brick building located at 1751 Scarth Street – a site now occupied by the Cornwall Center. The official opening was November 20, 1890 and featured the first public display of electric light in the city. After a couple of years in this location, it moved to the Donahue Block, also in downtown Regina, then to a building on South Railway Street, across the street from the train station.



1907

The cornerstone of the YMCA was laid in 1907. The architects for the YMCA building were Storey and Van Egmond. The building was officially opened on August 27, 1908.



1912

On June 30, 1912 at about 5:00 pm, the cyclone struck and knocked off the roof, most of the third floor and most of the back of the 1st building.



1940

125 year highlights



1947

In 1947 with money partially raised by a radio auction, the Regina Y's Men's Club purchased land and erected buildings on Echo Lake for a permanent Y camp site. Thousands of campers now count themselves as Ta-Wa-Si alumni and the facility has a proud legacy of yeoman service to the province. In 2004 the camp site was sold and the YMCA camping program became more focused on day adventures and northern wilderness experiences.



1959

The new YMCA was built on a site at the corner of McIntyre and 13th Avenue formerly occupied by Victoria School. It opened its doors in 1959.



1959

Racquetball originated in a YMCA in Greenwich, Connecticut in 1957. Most YMCA's (including Regina) were involved in early promotion of the sport. Ham Gosse (r), General Secretary of the YMCA of Regina from 1959 to 1979 is credited with introducing the sport to Saskatchewan. Ham made sure that the design of the 'new' Regina Y, which opened in 1959, included two courts. YMCA architects from New York were involved in the design process for the new Regina Y.



1968

The late 1960s and on into the 1980s, a group of men would gather on the front steps of the YMCA of Regina, dressed in (winter) jogging gear, and head out on a path down Albert Street to the front steps of the Legislative Building where they would pay homage to Ross Thatcher's 1962 attempt to kick down the doors to the building before turning the corner around Wascana Lake against the north wind back down Broad Street, through the park and directly into the Y's steam room and whirlpool to thaw themselves out before heading over to the award ceremonies, usually sponsored by a local brewery, at the Hotel Saskatchewan which were presided over by the event's godfather, Dr. Morris Schumiatcher and 'Schumie's' able assistant, Health Club Director Don Bennett. It was a wonderful way to usher in the New Year.



1980

In 1980, the YMCA of Regina re-launched itself as the Regina Family YMCA. Expanded locker facilities, additional exercise equipment and family programming meant that the whole family could enjoy the Y. A Woman's Program Director, Jan Fraser, was hired January 1st, 1981. April Barry became the first female member of the Board at the January 1982 AGM.



1990

The 1990's equalled fitness and was the start of volunteer led Fitness classes.



1991

Childbirth education and pre and postnatal fitness programs began at the YMCA in January of 1991. A Y's Mom's group (Mom's and their kids under 1 year) got underway in 1993. On December 12, 1999 hundreds of appreciative graduates and their family members gathered in the gym for a reunion with YMCA Perinatal Counsellor Sally Elliott.



2000

The YMCA of Regina Childcare Centre opened downtown as a 35 space facility in December of 2000. In 2006, an additional 90 spot childcare facility was opened in the new North-West Regina YMCA.

125 year highlights



2007

The Northwest YMCA opened, January 27th, 2007. Shortly afterwards the YMCA embarked on a Centennial Campaign to raise \$2.2 million to renovate the YMCA Downtown centre. Renovations included significant enhancements to the building infrastructure, upgrades to the Men's Plus area, a new lobby, the YMCA Community Café, and a new stairwell to the 2nd floor Conditioning Centre.



2008

In 2008 the YMCA of Regina had expanded and so it was decided to form more departments. Although the Y had been doing community programs for a number of years, the Community Development Department came to being with its own manager to further its progress.



2010

The GRAND OPENING of the Virtual Y program at Regina's Albert School was March 9, 2010. The Virtual Y was a new strategy for the YMCA of Regina that directed program dollars to communities where they are most needed, while using existing facilities. This was a unique approach to supporting children in their academic studies, fitness and social development. This pilot project was made possible through the support of our partners at Great-West Life, London Life, Canada Life, SGI and the Regina Public School Board.



2015

September 25, 2015 YMCA opens a 3rd YMCA facility in East Regina. This new centre is dedicated to Physical Literacy which includes the first warped walls in Saskatchewan. It also has Fitness on demand system with over 100 online fitness classes and cardio equipment with Blue tooth capabilities. The Y turns its focus on addressing the low levels of activity in children and the emerging trends towards the increase of unhealthy lifestyles.
